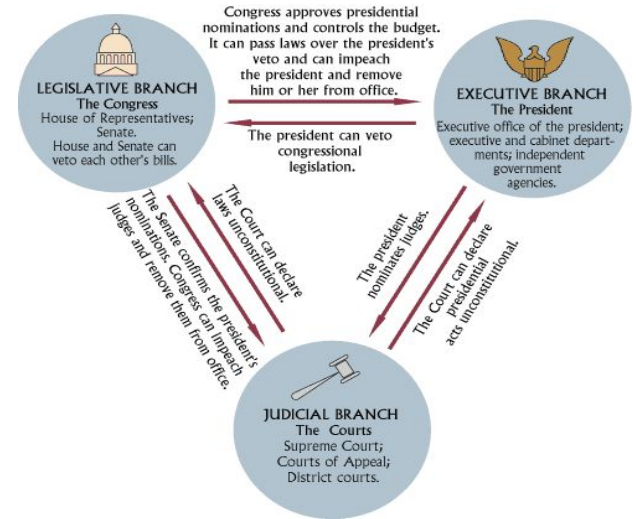
The Power of the Judicial Branch

- The Judicial branch of government is the least powerful branch of government.
- The judiciary department has no influence over the legislative and executive branch.
- It has no strength or will by themselves, they only have judgment.
- It relies on the aid of the executive branch



Importance of the Judiciary

- Hamilton pointed out the impotence of the judiciary to gain trust from the people
- Assure that the government wouldn't be used to take away their rights
- Each branch of government can check each other to ensure that those rights won't be denied
- Power of the people is superior to the legislation and judiciary



Position to Declare Acts

- Hamilton was in position of being in charge of declaring the acts of the constitution void
- It was the limitations that had to be preserved through the courts of justice
- The courts are created to check power of former decisions between the legislator and the people
- He was needed as a middleman between the people and the legislator to check their powers

- An independent judiciary provides reservations of particular rights and privileges.
